I knew that, if an assassination was plotted, only a tiny handful of officers would know about it and certainly an IONEC student would not be made privy to such sensitive information.

I was nevertheless a bit taken aback when the targeting officer for P4 section and assistant to String Vest, called me into his office. What do you reckon to knocking off Slobodan Milosevic then? he asked casually, as if seeking my views on the weekend cricket scores.

had a reputation in the office for being a maverick, but this seemed to be going too far. He was a rarity in the SIS in that he was a former comprehensive schoolboy and redbrick university graduate. In a form of reverse-snobbism he was chippy about this background and rarely missed an opportunity to snipe at minor public schoolboys, myself included. He did not like to be reminded that, after graduation, he had succumbed to elitism and done a PhD at Oxford. Even that, though, seemed a calculated snipe at academic conservatism. He wa a passionate supporter of the Sheffield Wednesday football team, and the subject of his anthropology thesis was tribalistic behaviour in modern football hooliganism.
